

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MESSAGE FROM PRESIDENT & CO-FOUNDER GARY L. SHAPIRO, PH.D



Each year brings new challenges and opportunities. As a growing organization, the challenges for the Orang Utan Republik Foundation has been to secure funds while maintaining a robust slate of programs. The opportunities enable us to be more effective in addressing our mission of saving orangutans.

Luckily, we were able to have a successful year in 2018 by raising adequate funds and bringing a new partner into the Orangutan Caring Scholarship Program which extended our unique student support effort to Central Indonesian Borneo. Now we have a competitive scholarship program in the name of the orangutan in four of the provinces where wild orangutans still range. By the end of 2018 we had given out 20 new scholarships bringing the total number of students who have benefited from the Caring Scholarship program to 150. Over 80 students have already graduated moving into positions of influence and advocacy for the great red ape. We were also challenged by our expansion in Sumatra as the Orangutan Caring Foundation of Indonesia completed its Memorandum of Understanding with the Gunung Leuser National Park authorities enabling the MECU team to address conservation challenges within the National Park in partnership with other NGOs. In addition to the conservation education programs that served as the starting point for the MECU program, the Indonesian foundation is taking on patrols and monitoring of illegal activities within the Park, restoration of degraded areas within the park, and community livelihood development in villages along the border of the Park.


Donors should realize their support of our work is a amazing investment in the future of forest, people and wildlife, including the orangutan. Thanks to all who have supported our work in 2018.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT TO REDUCE CONFLICT

2018 Mobile Education and Conservation Unit

The Mobile Education and Conservation Unit (MECU) program continues to enrich the lives of local villagers and to reduce human-wildlife conflict. Most are family farmers and smallholders that benefit by learning organic and sustainable farming techniques as well as ways to humanely repel orangutans from their orchards. Additionally, MECU educators go into the local schools, create Orangutan Caring Clubs to inspire young people to appreciate orangutans and nature then take action.

During its eighth year, MECU-8 continued providing various programs to the served communities including: Agricultural Demonstration Plots, the Smart House in Kinangkong, the Smart Car program, Forest Restoration program, Volunteer and Ecotour programs, Community Tree-planting activities, Orangutan Caring Week events, School and Extracurricular education programs, and Program Monitoring.







Memorandum of Understanding Signed

After months of negotiations between the leadership of the Orangutan Caring Club of Indonesia (YPOI), and the relevant officials from the Gunung Leuser National Park, a letter of agreement, Memorandum of Understanding and Annual Work Plan were signed allowing YPOI to conduct various conservation related activities within the national park. The activities include forest restoration in degraded areas within the park, investigation and monitoring of human-orangutan conflict as well as illicit activities including illegal logging, illegal farming, and wildlife poaching. MECU staff were given specific training by other agencies and NGOs that have conducted such activities.

The MOU will enable YPOI and the MECU program to complement the various conservation activities being conducted by other NGOs in coordination by the national park authorities within a very large landscape. So while the MECU program will continue to provide education, training, and community livelihood enhancements, it will also expand its portfolio of activities which will increase the capabilities and value of this local NGO within the region.

"As the one of Bornean Orangutan Caring Scholarship recipients, I am so grateful. There were so many experiences I got. The activities held by Yayasan Palung were very helpful me to my personal development. I will use my experience and ability in the campus to learn more related information in my studies on campus. The BOCS training by Yayasan Palung taught me to how to be a citizen reporter (write reports for the news), how to speak publicly, how to make a simple campaign use social media, and more."

Agustina—Veterinary Student from Aceh—Received Orangutan Caring Scholarship from funds donated by World Veterinary Service in 2017.

"From September 2018 I designed my research method. In October-November 2018, I conducted my research. The location of my first study was at the Pematang Siantar Animal Park, North Sumatra. There I took orangutan feces and recorded orangutan behavior and visitor behavior. Oh yeah, I forgot, there are 4 orangutans in Siantar and 3 Sumatran Orangutans (Stip, Bonaria, Corporal) and 1 Bornean Orangutan (Dino). During my research I had to go back and forth between Pematang Siantar- Banda Aceh. Which takes a lot of time and energy (because I don't use airplanes).

In December 2018, I processed orangutan feces as part of my research. My research method uses ELIZA (enzyme-linked immunosorbent assay) to look at the level of cortisol hormone metabolites in the stool. The reason I use fecal samples is because I avoid excessive restrain behavior that will make cortisol levels invalid and the data doesn't match what I expected. And this research will be completed in January 2018.

Even though my time and energy were divided into research. I also take part in conservation activities. Because that is my nature. I participated in mangrove tree planting activities. And reforesting the forest, which I hope contributes to the survival of humanity. I also attended seminars held at the Unsyiah veterinary faculty."

FACILITATING TREE PLANTING AROUND THE PARK

The MECU team isn't only concerned with the survival of orangutans but also the forest in which they live. That is why the MECU team works with community groups and students from kindergartens, primary schools, junior and senior high schools to involve them with tree planting.

During this time, they have planted trees on community walkways, along the river bank, and in the buffer zone between Gunung Leuser National Park and local community farms and other critical places.

The MECU team is also beginning to plant within the National Park as part of the MOU with the National Park authorities.





THE ORANGUTAN CARING SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM EXPANDS AGAIN

In 2018 OURF added a new partner to implement the Orangutan Caring Scholarships in Central Kalimantan. Borneo Nature Foundation had already established a relationship with the University of Palangka Raya so they were an ideal organization to promote and administer the unique program for students in biology and forestry. Dr. Shapiro met with the BNF team and the university administrators in May to officially set up the program starting with two new scholarships. BNF team members accepted applications, interview and evaluated numerous applicants and awarded the scholarship later that year. All in all twenty new Orangutan Caring Scholarships were given out in ceremonies in Ketapang, West Kalimantan, Medan, Sumatra, and Palangka Raya, Central Kalimantan.

By the end of this award period, OURF has given out 150 multi-year scholarships in the fields of biology, forestry and veterinary science. Over eighty graduates have completed their studies and are working for NGOs, government, the private sector or continuing their studies.

This unique, competitive scholarship program is the only one of its kind to provide tuition and research funding to students in the name of the orangutan. Funding for the scholarships have come from The Orangutan Project, Andrew Sabin Family Foundation, Australian AID, and numerous individuals.

OURF thanks our Indonesian partners: Orangutan Information Centre in Medan, Yayasan Palung in Ketapang, and now Borneo Nature Foundation in Palangka Raya for implementing this program.



EXPANDING OUR CONSERVATION REACH AS TOP-USA



OURF continued its partnership with The Orangutan Project (TOP) in 2018 as TOP-USA to increase funding for orangutan conservation and to further reduce the combined administration of two of the leanest charities on the planet today.


ORANGUTAN CARING WEEK

Since establishing Orangutan Caring Week in 2006, OURF has directed the growth of this annual event, which has expanded to become a global opportunity for zoos, orangutan organizations and other groups to promote the species and its plight in a special week. By creating a "critical mass" of support during the week, media attention is focused on the issues facing the orangutan.

In 2018, the theme of the week was "Valuing Orangutans over Profits to Avoid Extinction." The theme provided a topic that allowed organizations to discuss the dilemma affecting orangutan populations. Over the past 16 years, over 100,000 orangutans died on the island of Borneo, according to a scientific study that indicated that habitat destruction between 1999 and 2015, primarily for palm oil plantation and direct killing, caused the precipitous decline.

Moving to sustainable land management practices will be key to the long-term survival of orangutans and other wildlife that depend on forest habitat.

During Orangutan Caring Week, dozens of organizations participated in having these discussions around the world.

ECOTOURS TO EDUCATE & INSPIRE

In 2018, OURF partnered with Australian-based Orangutan Odysseys to conduct a mid-year ecotour of Tanjung Puting National Park. OURF President Dr. Gary Shapiro served as tour host to bring a small group of guests to observe orangutans and monkeys within the Sekonyer River system, including Tanjung Harapan, Pondok Tenggui, and the famous Camp Leakey. Today, ecotourists can come to Borneo and Sumatra to observe wildlife and to support local communities through their patronage of tour operators and ecolodges. IMPACTING POLICY ON THE RSPO

OURF joined the Roundtable on Sustainable Palm Oil in late 2011 at the request of the Orangutan Land Trust. In 2012, 2014, and 2017 OURF sat at the table with hundreds of other members at the annual meeting.

In 2018, OURF maintained its membership, attended the RSPO's RT16 in Kota Kinabalu, Sabah, Malaysia, and voted at the General Assembly. This particular meeting was significant in advancing the Principles & Criteria (P&Cs) for the RSPO which is done each 5 years. With work done by technical teams between changes, the resolutions voted upon added environmental and social improvements including No Deforestation, No planting on peat,

Fire prevention, and Human and Labor rights.

By creating P&Cs that members must abide by, everyone in the supply chain, from planters and growers to manufacturers will understand what actions will be necessary to have their products certified as sustainable. While not perfect, the RSPO provides a process that will better protect remaining forests and wildlife, including orangutans.








