


To save the orangutans of Indonesia through conservation education, outreach initiatives, and innovative collaborative programs that inspire and call people to action.



OUR VISION

Working under the ethos "Free to be Wild," OURF envisions a time when the people of Indonesia accept that orangutans and all other species that inhabit their rainforests have a right to live, and that their forests can be shared and utilized sustainably for the benefit of both animals and people.

PRESIDENT'S STATEMENT

Dear Friends and Supporters,

As we close out 2024, I am filled with pride and gratitude for what the Orang Utan Republik Foundation has achieved this year. This has been a year of transition, innovation, and renewed commitment to our mission of saving orangutans through education, empowerment, and collaborative conservation.

We celebrated the 19th year of the Orangutan Caring Scholarship Program (OCS), bringing the total number of students supported since inception to over 300, with nearly 200 graduates now serving Indonesia as biologists, foresters, veterinarians, educators, and conservation leaders. These graduates are living proof that long-term investments in human capacity yield profound benefits for orangutans and their forest homes.

2024 also marked the final full year of our Community Education and Conservation Program (CECP) in Sumatra. What began as a grassroots experiment grew into a model of school-based conservation, community outreach, organic farming training, and women-led microenterprise. CECP's legacy now passes into our next chapter: the Community Conservation Mentorship Initiative (CCMI), launching in 2025, which will train and support small, women-led groups to create impact across Sumatra and Borneo.



At the same time, we laid the groundwork for future innovation. The ROCKET initiative (Rainforest Orangutan Conservation Knowledge & Education with Technology) was developed with Indonesian universities to integrate drones, GIS, AI, and robotics into biodiversity monitoring. Partnerships with forward-thinking groups such as Lord of the Trees will allow us to pilot new tools in 2025, empowering students to apply technology in service of conservation.

PRESIDENT'S STATEMENT

We also designed the Guard-a-Wild Orangutan Program, a symbolic adoption model that, unlike traditional programs, connects supporters with wild orangutans living free in their native forests under long-term research. Its pilot phase begins in 2025 at the Tuanan Orangutan Research Station, with digital certificates funding field protection and scientific study.

Our fundraiser in Santa Monica was another highlight. With a nearly sold-out crowd at the Illusions Magic Lounge, we premiered "Ozi: Voice of the Forest"—an inspiring animated film about orangutans—while hosting a reception, silent auction, and book signing for my new memoir, Out of the Cage. Together, these activities raised both funds and awareness while building deeper community connections.

Finally, our Orangutan Caring Ecotour to Tanjung Puting inspired participants with firsthand encounters with orangutans in their natural habitat. These experiences not only transform hearts and minds but also generate support for ongoing conservation programs in Indonesia.



As we step into 2025, OURF is well-positioned to expand its reach, integrate innovation, and strengthen partnerships. The challenges remain urgent, but so does our determination. Together, we will continue to protect orangutans and the rainforests that sustain life for us all.





OUR IMPACT







2024 marked the final full year of CECP, our foundational program supporting local conservation education teams.

We continued support for grassroots efforts in Sumatra to raise awareness of orangutan conservation while enhancing livelihood, reducing human-wildlife conflict, and planting trees for the future.

CECP's legacy will carry forward as we transition to the Community Conservation Mentorship Initiative (CCMI) in 2025, expanding our impact through women-led and community-based leadership development.

Rainforest Orangutan Conservation Knowledge Education with Technology (R.O.C.K.E.T.)

- ROCKET aims to engage students and faculty in high and low technology including droneassisted biodiversity monitoring, conservation robotics, and Albased forest mapping.
- Early partnerships were initiated, including exploration with Lord of the for pilot testing in Central Kalimantan.






Guard-a-Wild Orangutan Program

OURF has been a leading force in establishing and promoting Orangutan Caring Week (OCW) since we transformed Orangutan Awareness Week to Caring Week in 2004. This was done in recognition of the need to move beyond awareness to action. Bringing about positive change only takes place when people care.



Orangutan Caring Week starts with a theme to focus our efforts. In 2024, our theme was "Orangutans Leading The Way: One Planet, One Future," which demonstrated the powerful intersection of cutting-edge technology and conservation.

VOLUNTEER ENGAGEMENT

From its inception, the Orang Utan Republik Foundation has relied on the dedication and passion of volunteers. Their time, skills, and energy have strengthened every facet of our work—while also providing them with meaningful opportunities to connect with others who share their commitment to conservation.

COMMITTEE ACTIVITIES

In 2024, OURF's committees provided vital leadership and energy, ensuring our programs and outreach remained strong.

The Social Media/Content Creation Committee expanded OURF's reach across platforms, creating consistent and engaging content to raise awareness about orangutan conservation and highlight OURF's programs. Their work boosted engagement and helped drive traffic to fundraising campaigns and events.

The Google Grant/SEO Committee took important steps toward improving OURF's digital visibility. By refining ad campaigns and keywords, the committee began laying the foundation to maximize the value of our Google Ad Grant and improve search engine optimization, ensuring OURF reaches broader audiences.

The Fundraising Committee organized our annual Santa Monica fundraiser featuring the film Ozi: Voice of the Forest, supported Giving Tuesday efforts, and worked on donor cultivation strategies to sustain core programs.



BORNEO ECOTOUR-2024

The Orangutan Caring Ecotour program to Tanjung Puting took place in mid-2024. The tour provided an opportunity for participants to experience the unique natural beauty of Borneo, encounter orangutans in their natural habitat, and contribute to the conservation efforts for these endangered primates.





The participants recognized the critical role of the ecotour in promoting conservation efforts. The highlight of the trip was the opportunity to hike through the breathtaking rainforests of national parks, witnessing the diverse flora and fauna, including orangutans in their natural habitat. The experience emphasized the urgency to protect these rainforests, as logging, coal mining, and palm oil plantations continue to threaten their existence.

BORNEO ECOTOUR-2024

Orangutan Caring Ecotour group successfully conducted the ecotour in Borneo/Indonesia, providing participants with a unique and meaningful experience. The well-organized itinerary, exceptional service by the local guides and hosts, and the opportunity to witness the beauty of the rainforests and orangutan habitats made the trip unforgettable. The tour served as a reminder of the importance of conservation efforts and the need to protect the environment for future generations. The participants strongly recommend this ecotour as a transformative experience for both individuals and the orangutans.





IMPACTING POLICY ON RSPO

OURF joined the Roundtable on Sustainable Palm Oil (RSPO) in 2011 to support a significant multi-stakeholder organization. We recognize that transforming diverse forests into plantations is unsustainable, but we remain hopeful that by working together with the sector, we can address the damage to orangutans and their environment.


